CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

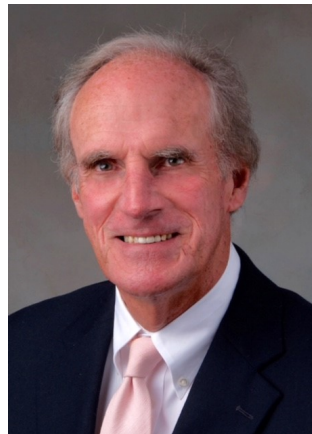
Lee Hawkins, Neighborhood Crime Watch Chairman

On December 27th, State Rep. Timothy Whelan and Lt. Governor Karen Polito presented Chief Frederickson with \$55,000 of annual funding for the next four years through the Violence Against Women's Act Stop Grant. The funding will be used to hire a full time Domestic Violence Advocate. The Advocate will improve communications with victims and families of violence through support services.

Wireless Direct Emergency 911 Calls Now Go Directly to YPDPSAP

The Yarmouth Police Department has become one of the few agencies in the Commonwealth to have the ability to directly receive and answer emergency 911 wireless telephone calls.

In the past, wireless calls would all go to the Massachusetts State Police in Framingham and then needed to be transferred.

Now, all wireless calls that occur in Yarmouth-- except those coming from Route 6 which will go to the State Police--will come directly to Yarmouth Police Department Public Safety Answering Point Dispatch Center (YPDPSAP) allowing us to send help quicker, safer, and more efficiently.

YARMOUTH POLICE DEPARTMENT DRONE

The Yarmouth Police Foundation and Bluecoats of Yarmouth made a formal presentation of the new YPD Drone being donated to the Town of Yarmouth and the Yarmouth Police Department on Thursday, December 7 at 2:30.

The cost of the Drone was \$7,600 which came equipped with one camera, an I Pad that the camera transmits video to, four battery packs and a carrying case. An additional infrared and heat seeking camera, FLIR, will be added in the near future for an additional cost of \$6,000. The new Drone, officially known as a small Unmanned Aircraft System, will have a variety of public protection and safety uses. Some of the uses are:

- Search and rescue for lost, missing, or endangered persons
- Photographic and video documentation missions
- Motor vehicle crash investigations, crash scene mapping
- Criminal investigations and crime scene mapping
- Tactical response missions (e.g., hostage rescue/barricaded subject)
- Fire Services support
- Homeland Security-related missions

There was a PowerPoint presentation made by Lieutenant Kevin Lennon in the YPD Meeting room followed by a question and answer segment and a live demonstration in the YPD parking lot. This event was open to the media and all members of the public.

PREVENT IDENTITY THEFT

Take steps to protect yourself from identity theft:

- Secure your social security number (SSN). Only give out your SSN when absolutely necessary.
- Don't respond to unsolicited requests for personal information (your name, birthdate, social security number, or bank account number) by phone, mail, or online.
- Contact the three credit reporting agencies to request a freeze of your credit reports.
- Collect mail promptly. [Place a hold on your mail](#) when you are away from home for several days.
- Pay attention to your billing cycles. If bills or financial statements are late, contact the sender.
- Enable the security features on mobile devices, especially if you have contacts, banking websites and applications saved.
- Update sharing and firewall settings when you're on a public wi-fi network.
- Review your credit card and bank account statements. Watch for unauthorized transactions.
- Shred receipts, credit offers, account statements, and expired credit cards, to prevent "dumpster divers" from getting your personal information.
- Store personal information in a safe place at home and at work.
- Install firewalls and virus-detection software on your home computer.
- [Create complex passwords](#) that identity thieves cannot guess easily. Change your passwords if a company that you do business with has a breach of its databases
- Review your credit report once a year to be certain that it doesn't include accounts that you have not opened. You can order it for free from [Annualcreditreport.com](https://www.annualcreditreport.com).
